Weekend Community Cleanups: DA McMahon's Office Joins Randall Manor Residents Association, Natural Resources Protective Association and Kayak Staten Island to Help Cleanup Communities

On Saturday, RCDA joined members of the Randall Manor Residents Association in cleaning up Alison Pond Park; On Sunday, RCDA and the Borough Presidents Office co-sponsored a cleanup on Front Street with Natural Resource Protective Association and Kayak Staten Island; Additional Cleanups scheduled for next weekend

Staten Island, N.Y. — The office of Richmond County District Attorney Michael E. McMahon participated in a series of community cleanups over the weekend, joining on Saturday with members of the Randall Manor Residents Association to cleanup Alison Pond Park. On Sunday, RCDA and the Borough Presidents Office co-sponsored a cleanup on Front Street with Natural Resource Protective Association and Kayak Staten Island. The cleanups were a part of the joint 'Be a Litter Hero' initiative, which encourages different community groups to organize their own community-led cleanups.

District Attorney Michael E. McMahon said, "I am proud to have supported two more successful community-led clean up events this weekend with the Randall Manor Residents Association at Alison Pond Park and the Natural Resource Protective Association and Kayak Staten Island on Front Street. With the help of more than 30 volunteers, the park was restored to a pristine, natural condition by removing dead trees, debris and by planting new trees and bulbs."

NRPA President Jim Scarcella said, “Natural Resources Protective Association and Kayak Staten Island is proud to work in partnership with the offices of the Richmond County District Attorney and Staten Island Borough President on their anti-litter campaign to clean up our Stapleton waterfront. Today, volunteers removed over 900 lbs of trash and recycled an additional 30 lbs of aluminum and glass. We look forward to continuing this collaboration to make Staten Island a cleaner place.”
